EDF Energy buys Dungeness Estate

DF Energy is the new owner of the Dungeness Estate which covers the iconic landscape of the fishing boats, houses and lighthouses. The energy company owns and operates Dungeness B nuclear power station adjacent to the Estate, and is the biggest employer in the area boosting the local economy by over £40 million each year.

Forming part of the Dungeness

National Nature Reserve (NNR) and Dungeness, Romney Marsh and Rye Bay Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), the Estate is also of international importance being within the Dungeness Special Area of Conservation (SAC) as well as the Special Protection Area (SPA) because of its bird interest. **EDF Energy** has pledged its commitment

to conserving and enhancing the special wildlife of this unique habitat while working with other landowners to manage the large numbers of visitors who come to experience the unique landscape.


"The Dungeness Estate is truly a special site," said Christine Blythe, EDF Energy's Biodiversity Manager, "so we are very pleased to be working with the Romney Marsh Countryside Partnership who will be able to provide us with their local knowledge and support."

Martin Pearson, station director at Dungeness B said: "We're delighted to be the purchasers of the Estate and want to reassure the community that it is our intention to be a responsible owner of the land. Dungeness B has been a huge part of the community for over 30 years; many of our employees live in the area and we bring business to local suppliers. We've always worked alongside the local community to preserve and enhance this unique environment and EDF Energy is committed to this."

Following the acquisition Dungeness B has held two residents' meetings to keep the community up to date, allowing them to meet the team and ask any questions.

Filming at Dungeness? Please read this first

he Dungeness Point is a private estate and is part of the wider Dungeness National Nature Reserve and is very popular with tourists, birdwatchers, anglers and photographers, owing to its unique landscape.

Survey highlights who comes to NNR and what they spend

t was reported in previous Shingle Issue newsletters that visitor surveys were being conducted at key Key findings included:

99% of visitors were from the UK with 51% being 'local' April 2014 and 70% had come 'from home' and 30% were 'on holiday' The average spend per group was £18.60 76% of interviewees aware of the area's rich wildlife

hotspots at Greatstone, Lade, Dungeness, Camber and Rye, along with online surveys – funded by Shepway and Rother District Councils.

support from Natural England and the Friends of Rye Harbour, commissioned visitor surveys along the coastline between Greatstone and Rye

> 1,099 on-site interviews were undertaken over eight days, in addition to online surveys, some of which were targeted at specialist users groups such as kite surfers and walkers.

The information gathered will be used to help produce an "Access Strategy" for the area, aimed at protecting the area's rich, diverse and unique wildlife, while allowing tourism to thrive. The strategy is expected to be completed by 2017.

Local stretch of coast path set for summer opening

he England Coast Path between Camber and Folkestone is due to open this summer.

The route will become a
National Trail and will come
around Dungeness. This exciting
project will eventually allow
walkers to enjoy England's coastline non-stop on a 2,700 mile trail,
once fully open in 2020.

The trail makes its way around Dungeness on top of the shingle bund in front of the power station and continues along Dungeness Road to Battery Road and beyond.

New infrastructure will soon be installed along the route to mark the alignment of the trail. Access to the shingle beach will also be signposted to help protect this internationally important site.
